Medicines Formulary New additions and changes

Luforbec 100/6 for asthma and COPD and 200/6 MDI inhaler for asthma only (Green) - Added as preferred cost-effective choice where indicated. Fostair remains available as second line choice where Luforbec is not tolerated.

Adjuvant bisphosphonates in early breast cancer—Formulary choices have been reviewed and aligned. Zoledronic acid remains first line (Red), with sodium clodronate for second line use (SpA). NB: Ibandronic acid 50mg has been removed from Beds/Luton Formulary (existing patients may remain on treatment).

Paraldehyde injection and Paraldehyde 50% in olive oil rectal solution for status epilepticus — Added to Milton Keynes Formulary (Red)

Actinic Keratosis Formulary choices of topical agents—Review of Formulary choices to align with national recommendations as outlined in Ardens templates. Available products carry a Green designation (previously SpA)

Heparin (10 units / ml and 100 units / ml) as flushes for paediatric community nursing services— Changed from Red to SpA to enable to supply for patients under the care of community nurses when maintaining patency of lines.

Micronised progesterone (Gepretix) for Hormone Replacement Therapy—Added (Green, first choice) alongside Utrogestan. Gepretix is a cost-effective identical product to Utrogestan.

Melatonin (Ceyesto) oral solution for insomnia in children and adolescents aged 6-17 years with attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD), where sleep hygiene measures have been insufficient—Added to Formulary to replace Kidmel and Colonis liquids. Ceyesto liquid is licensed and cost-effective but with the same composition and flavour as Kidmel. SCG for Beds/Luton and SpA for Milton Keynes (MK). NB: Ceyesto may also be used for off-license indications in children where clinically appropriate.

Ximluci - Cost-effective biosimilar ranibizumab brand added (Red) to both Formularies

Yuflyma - Cost-effective biosimilar adalimumab added (Red) to MK Formulary

Levonorgestrel 20 micrograms/24 hours Intrauterine Delivery System (Benilexa One Handed Intrauterine Device) - Added (Green) alongside Mirena and other long acting reversible contraceptives. Benilexa is a cost-effective device similar to Mirena. NB: Benilexa is licensed only for Heavy Menstrual Bleeding and Contraception (Not licensed for endometrial protection with oestrogen replacement therapy).

Torasemide for use during bumetanide shortage—Temporary addition of torasemide (Green) for use where furosemide is not a suitable alternative and bumetanide cannot be obtained.

Review and update of cost-effective Combined Oral Contraceptives—See Formulary for details of choices.

Updated local guidance for choice of glucose testing meters and testing strips

- Category 1a & 1b Meters and strips which are suitable for most people with type 1 and ketosis prone type 2 diabetes. Most people with T1DM (especially if at risk of DKA) will need a meter with a ketone testing functionality even if using a CGM device. Also included in this category are those who may have received structured education on additional functionality such as carbohydrate counting. Choices are: 4Sure Smart Duo, CareSens Dual.
- Category 2 Meters and strips which are suitable for most people with Type 2 diabetes (~ 90% of eligible T2DM patients will be suitable for these meters) Choices are: Finetest Lite smart, CareSens S Fit BT, Contour Plus Blue, GlucoRx Q, Palmdoc 2
- NB: CareSens S will replace TEE2 meters. New patients and those requiring a replacement of their old meter should be switched to CareSens S device.
- Category 3 Meters and strips which are suitable for people with Type 2 diabetes that require additional functionality.
 Choices are: Wavesense Jazz (wireless), Palmdoc 2 (multilingual/speaking features), Gluco Rx Nexus Voice (second line option speaking meter registered blind/ visually impaired).
