Reminder - to be eligible to become a Medication Champion you must:

- ⇒ Complete the CORE Tier 1 PrescQIPP e-Learning training AND
- ⇒ Attend the Tier 2 online virtual medication sessions, where possible AND
- ⇒ Attend a Medication Champion Training day

Medication Champion Quarterly Forums:

For our medication champions across BLMK, the care home team facilitate a one-hour virtual session delivered via MS teams every quarter. The forum is an opportunity to ask us any questions or share any examples of good practice. We also provide useful updates and deliver training presentations on selected topics. Thank you to the medication champions that attended our forum on 16th October. The date for the next forum will be circulated in due course.

Urinary Tract Infection (UTI) Resources

NHS England and the UK Health Security Agency are running a joint campaign to raise awareness of UTI prevention, symptom recognition and treatment including advice on how and when to seek help. This toolkit shines a spotlight on older adults (65 years +), who are at higher risk of the impacts of urinary tract infections.

Urinary tract infections (UTIs) affect the urinary tract, including the bladder, urethra or kidneys. UTIs and catheter associated UTIs are one of the leading causes of E. coli and Gram-negative bloodstream infections and are a significant cause of death and serious illness leading to hospitalisation, especially amongst the older population. UTIs may be treated with antibiotics, but they are not always needed.

Winter Vaccinations for Care Home Residents

It's that time of year when we need to start preparing our residents for the colder months. Many health conditions, including respiratory system diseases, can be worsened by cold weather so it is essential that we consider how the Winter Vaccination Programme can protect the most vulnerable.

COVID-19:

The primary aim of the COVID-19 vaccination programme continues to be the prevention of severe disease arising from COVID-19. Those at higher risk of serious outcomes are advised to top up their immunity by taking up the offer of a vaccination this autumn.

The cohort includes all those living in care homes for older adults, but this year the programme does not include the Covid-19 vaccination for frontline health and social care workers and staff working in care homes, <u>unless</u> they fall under the eligibility criteria (i.e. aged 75 years or over, or immunosuppressed) - see link below for further details.

Influenza (Flu):

Flu vaccination remains a critically important public health intervention to reduce morbidity and mortality in those most at risk including older people.

All adults over 65 years old and those living in a residential setting are eligible for the flu vaccine. Frontline health and social care workers can also get a flu vaccine through their employer. Social care staff without an employer-led occupational health scheme can continue to access the flu vaccination through their GP, community pharmacy or National Booking Service.

Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV):

RSV is a common respiratory virus that usually causes mild, cold-like symptoms, but can lead to severe illness for young infants and older adults. The vaccine will help to protect lives and prevent severe illness in those most vulnerable to RSV.

The RSV vaccine is being offered to adults who turn 75 on or after 1 September 2024 and those already aged 75 to 79. Individuals will remain eligible until the day before their 80th birthday.

Vaccinations remain some of the best defences we have and will help to ease some of the pressures being felt on adult social care and NHS services during the winter months.

Your aligned GP surgery or community pharmacy will be in touch to arrange administration of these vaccinations to your residents.

Administration of When Required Glyceryl Trinitrate (GTN) Spray for Angina

GTN spray can be prescribed on a When Required (PRN) basis for chest pain suspected to be angina. Prompt and correct use of GTN spray is crucial. PRN protocols for GTN spray should include clear instructions for staff to follow if a resident experiences chest pain suggestive of angina. This should include:

- Signs/symptoms to look for
- · Clear dosing instructions how many sprays to administer,
- What the time interval should be before administering further doses,
- What the maximum number of doses should be for the symptoms, and
- · Who/When to contact for emergency assistance if the treatment does not give relief

The prescriber should provide the specific directions for use for each person prescribed GTN spray. GTN spray may be prescribed for prevention of angina (prior to activity likely to cause angina) or for the treatment of an angina attack.

Care home staff are reminded to check the expiry dates on GTN sprays on a regular basis, preferably monthly. Stock should be carried forward and only replaced when expired.

Dispensing labels - dose changes

It is a legal requirement for a pharmacy to label a prescribed medicine. The label should contain specific information including the name of the patient, the date of dispensing, the name of the medicine and the directions for use of the medicine.

If a medicine dosage is changed, it is best practice that a new prescription is written so the care home can obtain a new medicine labelled with the correct dosage instructions. Care home staff are advised not to amend or alter labels on medicines under normal circumstances as there could be a risk of the incorrect dose inadvertently being administered to a resident.

In medical emergencies or out of hours, staff may be requested to act on a prescriber's instructions until a new prescription can be issued. Care homes should have robust policies to deal with such requests. If the instructions to change a dose are given verbally, two medication trained members of staff should listen and record the instructions. The care home should request any verbal instruction to be followed up with written instructions as soon as possible. Care home staff should ensure instructions and/or changes are clearly marked on the MAR chart or eMAR and include an audit trail for the amendment. Once the new prescription is received, the MAR chart/eMAR and care notes should be updated, and the medication with the original dose should be discarded.
